

Picasso is considered to be the inventor or Cubism.


In Cubist artwork, an artist looks at an object and breaks it up, and represents it in an abstract form.

Cubist paintings are not realistic, and are made up of lots of shapes.


Picasso's Cubist paintings were very different to the art he had made before.






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Making a Collage Portrait
